WordMasters Basics

You have tremendous flexibility in how you build your team and incorporate WordMasters into your school setting.

- Some schools have the whole class participate while other teams are comprised solely of interested students or those in an accelerated language arts program.
- Others offer it as an after-school enrichment opportunity. Some teams prepare during class while others meet after school or study at home.
- Some small schools and those who homeschool combine grades to create a team.

The right way is the one that works best for you and your students.

Analogies 101 Plus Set A

The examples below will introduce you to analogies. Each analogy consists of two pairs of words. Your job is to make the **second pair** express a relationship between its two words that is as similar as possible to the relationship between the words in the first **pair**. For instance, in the analogy

NIGHTTIME : MOON :: DAYTIME :____

the best word to place in the blank would be **SUN**, because the daytime sky is lit by the sun just as the nighttime sky is lit by the moon.

Here are three important things to remember when you think about analogies:

PARTS OF SPEECH. If the words in the first pair express a "noun : adjective" or "verb : noun" or "adjective : adjective" relationship (for instance), the second pair should show the same relationship between parts of speech.

WORD ORDER. If the first pair expresses a "tool user : tool" relationship (for instance), the second pair must express the same relationship in the same order (tool user first, tool second).

EXACTNESS. Sometimes two or more of the given choices would make fairly good sense in the blank. When this happens, you should choose the word or pair of words that most exactly suits the relationship you're expressing.



Analogies 101 Plus Detailed Answer Key Set A

MOTHER: SON :: FATHER : DAUGHTER

A SON is the child of opposite gender from a MOTHER. A DAUGHTER is the child of opposite gender from a FATHER.

- CHILD is not the best answer because a CHILD is not the child of opposite gender from a FATHER.
- · PARENT is not the best answer because a PARENT is not the child of opposite gender from a FATHER.
- GRANDSON is not the best answer because a GRANDSON is not the child of opposite gender from a FATHER.
- BABY is not the best answer because a BABY is not the child of opposite gender from a father.

ATTIC : BASEMENT:: MOUNTAIN : VALLEY

An ATTIC is the <u>highest</u> part a <u>house</u> and a BASEMENT is the <u>lowest</u> part of a <u>house</u>. A MOUNTAIN is a <u>high</u> point in the <u>land</u> and a VALLEY is a low point in the land.

- HILL is not the best answer because a HILL is not a low point in the land; a HILL is a smaller version of a MOUNTAIN.
- OCEAN is not the best answer because an OCEAN is not a low point in the land. An OCEAN is made of water.
- SKI SLOPE is not the best answer because a SKI SLOPE is not a low point in the land. It is a trail from a high point to
 a lower one.
- RIVER is not the best answer because a RIVER is not a low point in the land. A RIVER is made of water.

COUNTRY : PRESIDENT :: SCHOOL : PRINCIPAL

The PRESIDENT is the leader of a COUNTRY. The PRINCIPAL is the leader of a SCHOOL.

- STUDENTS is not the best answer because STUDENTS are not the leader of a SCHOOL.
- TEACHER is not the best answer because a TEACHER is not the leader of a SCHOOL. A TEACHER is the leader of a class.
- DESK is not the best answer because a DESK is not the leader of a SCHOOL.
- RULES is not the best answer because RULES are not the leader of a SCHOOL.

BLACK : GRAY :: BROWN : TAN

GRAY is a lighter shade of BLACK. TAN is a lighter shade of BROWN.

- WHITE is not the best answer because WHITE is not a lighter shade of BROWN.
- YELLOW is not the best answer because YELLOW is not a lighter shade of BROWN.
- PINK is not the best answer because PINK is not a lighter shade of BROWN.
- DARK is not the best answer because DARK is not a lighter shade of BROWN.

PAST : FUTURE :: YESTERDAY : TOMORROW

This is an *antonym* analogy. The PAST happened <u>before today</u>; the FUTURE will happen <u>after today</u>. YESTERDAY happened <u>before today</u>; TOMORROW will happen <u>after today</u>.

- NOW is not the best answer because NOW will not happen after today.
- THE DAY BEFORE is not the best answer because THE DAY BEFORE today and YESTERDAY are synonyms, not antonyms.
- AFTER is not the best answer because while AFTER may happen <u>after today</u>, it is not the opposite of YESTERDAY. Also, PAST, FUTURE, YESTERDAY and TOMORROW are all nouns, while AFTER is an adverb.
- NEW YEAR'S DAY is not the best answer because it is a specific day, while YESTERDAY is not a specific day.

. CARPENTER : HAMMER :: GARDENER : SHOVEL

This is a user : tool analogy. A HAMMER is a tool a CARPENTER uses. A SHOVEL is a tool a GARDENER uses.

- SEEDS is not the best answer because SEEDS are not a tool a GARDENER uses.
- SOIL is not the best answer because SOIL is not a tool a GARDENER uses.
- GARDEN is not the best answer because GARDEN is not a tool a GARDENER uses.
- FLOWERS is not the best answer because FLOWERS are not a tool a GARDENER uses.



Grade 6– Blue Division First Challenge Meet – Word List November 2020

All of the words listed below will appear in the first **WordMasters Challenge™**, which will be held at your school between November 9th and November 25th. (Your teacher will tell you exactly when the Challenge is scheduled for your team.) The **WordMasters Challenge™** is an analogy-solving competition. The contest will challenge you to use the words from your list in logical pairs that will look like this:

PROMISE : WITHDRAWN :: PLAN : _____

- a. explained
- b. proffered
- c. fostered
- d. cancelled e. changed

To succeed in this competition, you will have to understand the exact meanings of all your words, and you will have to reason carefully about the relationships shown in the pairs. In the example above, the correct answer is **(d) cancelled** because when a **promise** is **withdrawn**, it is taken back or <u>removed from consideration</u>; in a similar way, a **plan** that is **cancelled** is called off and <u>removed from consideration</u>.

Here are some tips to help you get ready for the WordMasters Challenge™:

- After you have learned the meanings of your words, think about possible relationships among them.
 - Which words have similar meanings?
 - Which words have nearly opposite meanings?
 - Remember, some words have more than one meaning.
 - Think about some categories into which several words might be grouped.
- Be sure you understand the part of speech of a word (for example, noun, verb or adjective) as it is used in the analogy.
 - Many words on this list (such as "snicker" and "sneer") can be either a noun or a verb depending upon how they are used.
- Pay special attention to the prefixes and suffixes of words, because they are often clues to meaning and part of speech.
- Try to familiarize yourself with other forms of these words, for example:
 - Not just "familiar", but also "familiarity" and "familiarize"
 - Not just "alienate", but also "alien"
 - Not just "affected", but also "affectation"
 - Not just "colloquial", but also "colloquialism"
- Keep this list! Some of these words will also appear in the second and third WordMasters Challenge™ meets, scheduled for later this school year.

Step 6: Submit Scores Online To submit your team's scores for each meet:

- Download the answer key from your Dashboard
- Score Challenge Tests
- Select "Submit Scores" from your Dashboard
- Enter student scores (no limit). You can create student records at anytime prior to the Challenge Meet in "Manage Teams & Students"
- The system will automatically calculate your team score (sum of top 10 individual scores)

Since the online system is calculating the team score, test results must be reported by the deadline to be included in the competition results!

Step 7: Acknowledge Individual & Team Results

- Check website postings after each meet for:
 - Top teams in each division
 - Students with perfect scores
 - Overall statistics related to meet results
- Acknowledge students for their hard work and outstanding achievements. Challenge Tests are difficult! They should feel proud of their efforts.
- We will draft a press release for every school with a team placing within the top ten of their division and/or a student receiving a perfect score.
- You can write your own press release! Find a template you can customize under "Teacher Tools" to share with your local media and school communications.

Step 8: Repeat for Meets #2 and #3

Repeat Steps 3-7 for each remaining Challenge Meet:

- Download Word Lists and Challenge Tests when available
- Submit scores prior to the Score Reporting Deadline

Each successive meet will be somewhat more difficult than the one before it. The analogies in Meet # will feature words from each of the first two Word Lists (50 words); Meet #3's analogies will be based on all three Word Lists (75 words). Students should therefore save all their Word Lists and study materials.

Step 9: Celebrate Cumulative Results

After Meet #3, the system will automatically calculate cumulative individual and team scores.

Check web postings to see if any of your students qualified for national recognition or if your team ranked among the top ten teams per division. Step 10: Distribute Team Awards

Before Meet #3, we will mail the following for each enrolled team:

- 1 Champion Medal-presented to the student of your choice (top scorer, most improved, best team player, etc). It's up to you.
- **10 Team Certificates** to present to team members
